MELBOURNE BEACH THE RYCKMAN HOUSE

Built in 1889 by Jacob Fox. It was purchased by G. E. Ryckman who is listed as an incorporator in the Melbourne and Atlantic Railroad Company. Restoration of this building is a current project of the Melbourne Beach Historical Preservation and Awareness Board.

MELBOURNE'S RIVERVIEW NEIGHBORHOOD site of Riverview Village, Melbourne's first platted subdivision. This scenic drive has some of Melbourne's oldest residences once homes of local bankers, plantation owners, investors, doctors, and the Carlton Hotel..

Presented by Diane Barile, resident, owner of the historic Elizabeth Eaton house. She is adjunct professor at FIT and a member of the Melbourne Historic Preservation Board.

EAU GALLIE THE EAU GALLIE ARTS DISTRICT (EGAD)

This redevelopment district includes the Brevard Art Museum and Museum School, Historic Rossetter House Museum, Eau Gallie Riverfront Library, Eau Gallie Civic Center, two public parks, a band shell and fishing pier. Part of the Vision for this area includes preserving historical elements to support the cultural heritage of Eau Gallie.

Presented by Gene Davis, member of the Eau Gallie CRA Advisory Board. Retired as a Colonel from the Air Force, he has been involved in many organizations including the Space Coast Writers Guild, the Space Coast International Visitor's Council and is currently president of Tiger Bay.

DEAR MEMBERS AND FRIENDS

On July 22nd I attended a very lengthy Brevard County Commission budget workshop. It began at 6 PM but I had to leave on July 23rd at 2:30 AM because I might fall asleep while driving home if I stayed any later. I attended because the Director of Parks and Recreation (the budgetary home of Brevard's history) recommended defunding the Historical Commission.

In the August 28, 2010 edition of the Florida Today, Bob Gross said it best. "Brevard County has the richest history of any county in the United States,' said Bob Gross of Rockledge, historian and former commission chairman. "We were occupied by the Spanish, the French, the English...We're given credit that Ponce de Leon first landed here...and Cape Canaveral was the first named geographic landmark on the continent of North America. And we launched the first space travel to the moon. We cover the whole gamut...No other county has the history that we have, and the county itself has done virtually nothing to promote that."

In difficult economic times the arts, culture and environment are easy budget cutting targets. Yet these are the things that raise the quality of our lives and offer us hope. Please support the Brevard County Historical Commission by contacting your County Commissioner and asking them to include funding in the 2011-12 budget. Final budget votes will be September 14th and 28th.

HURRICANES: An Historical Perspective

From the pages of the *East Coast Advocate*, October 1,1909 MERRITT

"From a meteorological point of view the vicinity of Cape Canaveral is the most desirable point to locate in the semi-tropics, according to the observations of an Italian mechanical engineer. Hence his appearance on the Indian River in search of a homestead.

The big storms that sweep over the West Indies from Cape Verde, Africa, cross the Atlantic, describing a semi-circle, reform, hit the Windward Isles (aptly named) and strike the coast near Charleston, they proceed up the Atlantic coast and out to sea near Boston; or they go up the Gulf of Mexico, striking Galveston, thence through the Southern into the Middle Atlantic States.

The region about Cape Canaveral the Italian engineer regards as a calm belt. His view seems to be confirmed by the Weather Bureau at Washington and verified by the experience of those inhabiting the Indian River region. Cape Canaveral seems to mark the natural divide in the atmospheric forces. The divide extends across the state due west, including the Indian River orange belt.

The visitation of destructive storms in this vicinity are rare. As a rule they pass by, up the coast or across the Gulf. Therefore the Indian River region will always be a desirable location for winter

homes.

Sail boats plied the river every day last week while the big storm was circling around us from the Gulf to the Atlantic, and our friends north were in dreadful apprehension that we were in the path of the storm."

East Coasts Advocate, October 15, 1909 THE HURRICANE

"The hurricane the first of the week did great damage to Key West, estimated at \$2,000,000. At Miami there was some damage but principally to buildings in course of construction. The Key West extension of the Florida East Coast Railway escaped serious damage, due mainly to the storm warnings sent out by the Weather Department and the precautions taken by those in charge to protect property and the lives of the workmen. After visiting Miami the hurricane continued its course out on the broad Atlantic.

No apprehension was felt at Titusville as this section is out of the course of storms going up the Atlantic. In fact, that territory adjacent to Cape Canaveral is said by scientists to be the most protected on the Atlantic Coast."
